# Presenting Your Research

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#### "Elevator talk"

■ 2-3 minute presentation, no visual aides

The goal is to get the audience interested in your work

- Short presentation 15-20 minutes
  - No outline
  - Covers single topic
  - The presentation must contain the following:
    - Motivation
    - Setting up the problem
    - Some results
    - Lots of pictures
  - 10-12 slides

- 30 minute talk
  - Optional outline
  - Covers single topic
  - The presentation must contain the following:
    - Motivation
    - Setting up the problem
    - Some intermediate steps
    - Results
  - 20-25 slides

#### One-hour talk

- Has to have outline
- May cover multiple topics
- Contains everything mentioned before
- You should guide the audience through the presentation
- Lots of pictures will minimize number of people that fall asleep

### **Designing the Slides**

- Slides must have Titles
- Use high-contrast color schemes in Powerpoint
- Use bullets
- Use large fonts
- Number the slides
- One slide per minute max
- Your audience will read your slides

#### One topic per slide

Each slide must talk about a single topic

Vou can use multiple slides per large topic

Avoid "busy" slides

#### Types of talks:


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#### Graphs and images

One graph per slide (unless you have to compare two graphs)
Use arrows to point out the important parts
