Description: Continuation of MATH 140, including most topics from Chapters 6-10 in the same text as the MATH 140 text. Note: Credit will only be given for one of Math 141 and Math 221.

Exams: There will be 4 midterm exams during the semester, each for the total of 100 points. They are scheduled on September 23, October 11, November 6, and December 4. The lowest score (including absences) is dropped.

The final exam is worth 200 points.

Calculators: You will need a programmable graphics calculator for some homework and section quizzes. You will need to put two programs on the calculator. You are responsible for knowing how to operate your calculator, but for some Texas Instruments graphics calculators (TI-82,83, ...) the two programs are on the course page.

Calculators and any other electronic devices (including cell phones) are NOT allowed on quizzes, midterm tests, nor on the final.

Quizzes: Quizzes are scheduled at the beginning of the discussion sections on the following days: 9/12, 10/01, 10/17, 10/29, 11/19, 11/26, 12/2. Each quiz is for the total of 20 points. The lowest 2 scores (including absences) are dropped.

Homework: There will be Webassign (online) homeworks during the semester. Homeworks are scored online. A flat score of 50 points will be given for scoring at least 30% of points available on Webassign. 0 points is assigned if the student does not reach that mark of 30%.

Enter Webassign by <http://www.webassign.net/umd/login.html> and click LOG IN. Assignments close at 8 am on Tuesdays and Thursdays.

Grading: The maximum point total is 650 points. The total used to calculate the final grade is the minimum of the two numbers: 650 points and the highest score in the class. The setting of letter grades will be based on the number of points and will be not worse than: 60% - D, 70% - C, 80% - B, 90% - A.

Attendance and absences: You are responsible for the material covered in class, whether you attend or not. You are also responsible for the announcements made during class; they may include changes in the syllabus.

The instructor will adhere strictly to the official university policy on makeup exams. In particular, it is the policy of the University to excuse the absences of students that result from the following causes: illness of the student, or illness of a dependent; religious observance (where the nature of the observance prevents the student from being present during the class period); participation in university activities at the request of University authorities; and compelling circumstance beyond the student's control. Students claiming excused absence must apply in writing and furnish documentary support for their assertion that absence resulted from one of these causes. Moreover, foreseeable absences (such as those resulting from religious holidays or participation in university-sponsored events) must be submitted in writing to the instructor by Sept. 15. Specifically, for medically necessary absences, if you are absent on days when tests or quizzes are scheduled, you are required to notify your TA in advance, and upon returning to class, bring documentation of the illness, signed by a health care professional.

Disabilities: If you have a disability disallowing you to test under the usual time or in-class conditions, you may contact the office of Disabled Students Services (DSS) in Shoemaker. **(Please let me know by Sept. 15 if you think you may require these services.)** If they assess you as meriting private conditions and/or extra time, then you may arrange to take your tests at DSS, with extra time as they indicate. You must arrange this well in advance of a test (in particular: no retakes). **Remember: I need to sign the document.**

Emergency closures: In case of an emergency that closes the University for an extended period of time (for example, due to inclement weather), be sure to access your email for instructions from me. Should any classes or exams be cancelled, please check the class schedule page for updated schedule information.
